Ray Starkie Best Game Prize 2018-19

There were 5 entries for the Ray Starkie Best Game competition. All five games were finely played by the winners - but I think Ray would have most enjoyed his team mate Will Burt's fine sacrificial attack against yours truly and I gave this game the top honour. Here are the games in no particular order with some light annotations.

Ward, Gareth - Rumsby, Steve

Oxon v Berks U150, 19.01.2019

1.d4 Nf6 2.Nf3 g6 3.e3 Bg7 4.Nbd2 0-0 5.Bd3 d6 6.c3 Nbd7 7.0-0 c5 8.Re1 b6 9.e4 e5 10.d5 Nh5 11.Nf1 Nf4 12.Ng3 Nxd3 13.Qxd3 a5 14.a4 Nf6 15.Bg5 h6 16.Bc1 Nh7 17.b3 f5 18.Ra2 f4 19.Nf1 g5 20.h3 Qe8 21.N3h2 h5 22.c4? This move means that White can't get any counterplay on the queenside and must just await his fate on the kingside. Generating anything on the queenside would anyway have been difficult – but if any move seals Black's fate, it's this one.

22...Qg6 23.f3 Nf6 24.Rae2 Bd7 25.Nd2 Rf7 26.Rf1 Raf8 27.Kf2 g4 28.fxg4 hxg4 29.hxg4 Bxg4 30.Nhf3 Bh5 31.Ke1 Qg3+ 32.Kd1 Ng4 33.Nb1 Ne3+ 34.Bxe3 fxe3 35.Qxe3 Bxf3 36.gxf3 Rxf3 37.Rxf3 Rxf3 38.Qc1 Rf1+ 0-1. A convincing game by Black – but his attack was for free because White didn't generate any real distractions. As a Kings Indian addict myself – nice to see such a thematic and well played KID attack.

Hardwick, Alexander - Waugh, Bob

Univ 2 v Cowley 3, 02.05.2019

1.e4 c5 2.Nf3 d6 3.d4 cxd4 4.Nxd4 Nf6 5.Nc3 a6 6.f4 e6 7.Be3 b5 8.Qf3 Bb7 9.Bd3 Nbd7 10.g4 Nc5 11.g5 Nfd7 12.0–0!? Castling the other way seems more natural.

12...Be7 13.b4 Nxd3 14.cxd3 0–0 15.Qh5 d5 16.Rf3 Re8 17.f5 e5? 18.f6? Instead 18.g6! fxg6 19.fxg6 h6 20.Bxh6 would have won for White!

18...g6 (18...Bxf6!)

19.Qh4 exd4 20.Bxd4? 20.fxe7! Qb6! 21.Bf2 dxe4 is unclear.

20...Bf8 21.Rh3 h5 22.gxh6 Kh7 23.exd5 Ne5?! 24.Ne4? 24.Re1! Bd6 25.Rhe3 is unclear again.

24...Qxd5! Defending f7 and attacking g2. Now it's over as Black has the extra piece and the more dangerous attack.

25.Bxe5 Rxe5 26.Rc1 Qd4+ 27.Kf1 Bxe4 28.dxe4 Rxe4 29.Qg3 Rf4+ 0–1 Black defended well – but White missed his big chance and Black counterattacked effectively. Fighting chess by both players.

Truran, Mike - Kaodwala, Nalin

Witney 1 v Cowley 1, 15.04.2019

1.d4 Nf6 2.c4 g6 3.Nc3 d5 4.cxd5 Nxd5 5.e4 Nxc3 6.bxc3 Bg7 7.Be3 0-0 8.Rc1 c5 9.Qd2 e5 10.d5 b6 11.f3 f5 12.exf5!? A bit inconsistent given White's previous move.

12...gxf5 13.Bg5 Qe8 14.Bc4 b5 15.Bb3 c4 16.Bc2 Nd7 17.Ne2 Qf7?! Completing development would seem the most pressing requirement.

18.0–0 Nf6 19.d6 f4?! Losing control of an important square.

20.g3 h6 21.Bxf6 Bxf6 22.Be4 Rb8 23.gxf4 Bh3 24.Bd5 (24.Kh1!) **Be6 25.Rfd1 Kh8** 25...Bxd5! 26.Qxd5 Qxd5 27.Rxd5 exf4 might have hung on.

26.Bxe6 Qxe6 27.f5 Qxf5 28.Qxh6+ Kg8 29.Ng3! After 29.Kf2? Bg5! would have turned the tables.

29...Qd7 30.Ne4 This well placed knight and an extra pawn give White a huge advantage.

30...Bg7 31.Qh5 Rf5 32.Qg4 Rbf8 33.Rc2 a5 34.Rg2 R8f7 35.Nc5 Qa7 36.d7

1–0 Well played by White and another real fight of a game. I could feel the tension and the high premium on each move. White did especially well to avoid the tempting trap 29.Kf2.

Rose, Matt - Burt, Will

1.e4 e5 2.Nf3 Nc6 3.Bc4 Nf6 4.d3 Bc5 5.c3 d6 6.a4 a5 7.0–0 h6 8.Na3 0–0 9.Nc2 Be6 10.Bb5?! Ne7 11.d4 Bb6 12.Re1 Ng6 13.d5?! Bg4 14.h3 Bh5!? 15.Qd3? (diagram) Played after long think (never think too long!) and because I couldn't see any advantage in 15.g4 Nxg4 16.hxg4 Bxg4 17.Ne3 Bxe3 18.Bxe3 f5.



15...Nxe4!! Ouch! 16.Qxe4 f5 17.Qc4 Bxf3 18.gxf3 f4! 19.Qf1 Nh4 20.Kh1!? Rf5! 21.Bd3! Rh5 22.Re2 Played to free e1 for the knight - but it doesn't work. 22.Be4 Qd7 and now 23.Kg1 Rg5+ 24.Kh1 Rg2 would cost White his queen - but might be the only defence.

22...Nxf3 23.Ne1 Nxe1! 24.Rxe1 Qd7 25.Kh2 Bxf2 26.Re2 Qg4! 27.Bf5 Rxh3+!

0–1 Black's 15th was a great sacrifice and well followed up. The finish was very nice.
